Senior Pastor's Report

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

This has been our second full year impacted by Covid19 but thankfully in July we were able to resume meeting in person! At first it was strange to be back in the building but now, nine months later, it feels normal once again! Our Sunday morning service is both in-person and online and I want to especially thank the media, sound, and worship teams for enabling this hybrid reality.

Our return as an in-person community has included pizza in the park after our Sunday services in the fall, a welcome dinner for new attendees (13) in October, and a fun and engaging Christmas Eve service. Omicron took some of the wind out of our sails in January but we managed to keep going and the children and families returned in February and March. April featured a return to pizza in the park, a special child dedication service on Palm Sunday (Ada and Ezra Gutwin, Celestine and Benny Lecarme, and Kewli Shitemi), a thoughtful Good Friday service, a beautiful celebration of the life of Donna Richardson on Holy Saturday, and an amazing baptism service (Anna Bailey, Brian Thurm, and Scott Thurm) on Easter Sunday with 118 in attendance! God has been good to us in this year of return from what has felt like an exile.

I am so thankful for the church staff. Anna Bailey came on as a part time administrator in July following Karen's move to Rochester, NY. Karen has remained on staff, helping with administration remotely to supplement Anna's in person work. Rahel, Pastor Shtem, and I have been working more closely together as we seek to deepen the discipleship of our entire community. I thank God for such collaborative and gifted co-laborers in the gospel. We continue to integrate the sermon with the discipleship groups and are also being helped to broaden our discipleship by coaching from Joe Reed of the Exponent Group. Our biggest challenge is not a new one - the harvest remains plentiful but the workers are few and even more so due to Covid...

This year I have also been very involved in both the renting and renovating of our building. We continue to rent to the Justice House of Prayer/Hilltop Church (JHOP/HC), Mahanaim Church, and The Resting Place Church. There have also been a few special events such as funerals, weddings, and hosting mission teams. The rental activity is considerable and Karen partners with me in managing it. The renovation side has included additional wiring in the fellowship hall and the JHOP office downstairs (\$6,000), fiberglass restoration of the baptistery (\$6,000), and major roof work which is scheduled to start in May (\$100,000; we secured a \$50,000 grant from the Cambridge Historical Commission).

The elders have a separate report but I am thankful for the leadership and oversight they provide in addition to our staff. This year it was a privilege to serve with Lisa Carr, Paul Carter, Rebecca Gutwin, Bill McLaurin, and Melaku Zewde.

The online prayer ministry continued throughout the year and I am thankful for the committed core of intercessors who log on daily to pray. Please join us whenever you can and I especially invite you to either our Monday evening

prayer for our local partners, or our Wednesday evening prayer for the nations, or our Friday evening prayer for healing.

Finally, there were two items that were discussed at length at our semi-annual meeting last November that I want to follow up on. The first was a proposed sabbatical for me this spring which was approved with some conditions. I have decided to forgo the sabbatical at this time due to both church and family considerations but may ask again at a more opportune moment. The second item was Rahel's ordination which was also approved. I had hoped to complete this process by spring but am now aiming for the fall. Stay tuned.

Children and Family Ministry Report

Dear church family,

"The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases; his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness." Lamentation 3:22-23.

As I reflect on this past year, first, I am grateful for God's love, mercy and faithfulness that we see everyday. It is through his mercy and grace that we were able to wrap up 2021 zoom classes and move to an in person meeting in July. I am grateful for all the volunteers (parents, young adults and youth) who give so much to the children and family ministry.

Discipleship:

Last year in June we wrapped up our zoom children's program with a picnic in the park. It was our first gathering since Covid hit. We were excited to meet in person to fellowship and have time together. Since July we have had our children's program in person. As for now the children's discipleship is between home-based discipleship (led by parents) and church-based discipleship (led by children ministry volunteers).

Little Kids Club (LKC) **and Kids Club (**LKC): We have been using the curriculum, "Bible in One year," which takes us through the whole Bible in one year. However, we have broken it up into two years. We are going through the Old Testament this year and plan to go through the New Testament next year. In addition, this curriculum gives us flexibility for parent's online access and modifies the lessons for home discipleship.

Growing in God (GIG): We have been meeting on the 2nd and 4th Sunday of the month, as a sermon alternative parallel to what the congregation are studying. Recently it has been the gospel of Luke. In the month of November, we had a guest speaker who spoke to the congregation about Afghan refugees who settled in the US. The GIG students reviewed the presentation about Afghan refugees and discussed why refugees leave their country. In addition, they explored biblical refugee characters and what the word of God said about refugees and strangers (Leviticus 19:33- 34 and Hebrew 13:1-2). On October 17th , they hosted a bake sale and raised \$307. With the money they had earned, they bought school supplies and prepared and delivered two baskets of gifts for Afghan refugees' families who settled in Massachusetts.

Children's Sermon: Our children experience community worship and have special children's songs every Sunday. In addition, on the first Sunday of the month, they stay in the service to listen to a children's sermon and participate in communion. We are thankful for Pastor Dan's leadership.

Children's choir: "From the lips of children and infants you, Lord, have called forth your praise" Psalm 8:2. With the Leadership of Sarita Kwok and Anna Bailey, on Thanksgiving, Christmas Eve service and Easter Sunday, our children's choir presented songs for the congregation. It was a joy and blessings to hear our children singing. I am grateful for the leadership of Sarita and Anna.

Children dedications: A few weeks ago, on Palm Sunday, we had the joy of witnessing parents dedicate children. In Luke 18:15-17 it says, when parents brought their children to Jesus, Jesus blessed them." In the same way, as we anointed families with oil and prayed over the scriptures, we proclaimed Jesus' blessing over the children.

Prayer- Every Thursday, during our online noonday prayer time, we pray for our children and youth regularly. I am encouraged and blessed to pray with the faithful prayer warriors who intercede for the next generation.

This last week's children's Bible lesson was about the very famous Bible story of David and Goliath. The main point was <u>God is on our side</u>. As I look back on this past year, in this uncertain time <u>God has been on our</u> <u>side</u>. We just need to remind ourselves <u>God is on our side</u> no matter how big a giant we face. He who began the good work in us will carry it on to completion until the day of Jesus Christ (Philippians 1:6).

<u>Worship Team Report</u>

This year the CBC worship team celebrated with all of you the Lord's goodness in returning us to in-person meetings. Starting at the beginning of the summer, a team led by Paul Carter worked to upgrade the sanctuary's sound and media technology, preparing for the challenge of running a zoom broadcast in conjunction with an in-person meeting. During that time, Karl and Nathan took a break from leading worship online to help with that effort, and other members of the team stepped in to lead using songs recorded over the past year.

Then on July 11th, we led worship at our first in-person service since March of 2020! Since then we have been learning and adjusting. For example, we no longer use speakers pointed back toward us on stage ("stage monitors"), since our system now allows us each to use earphones to hear ourselves more clearly. This has been an overall plus for the team members, and has hopefully improved the overall sound in the sanctuary.

We also experimented with some of the 60-odd recordings we made last year, seeing if we could use them as audio accompaniment tracks to fill out our live sound on stage. We retained the capability of leading worship remotely for online services for the few weeks when we had to refrain from meeting in person. We also continued to include a "children's song" as part of the in-person service.

In November, we replaced the old drum set with a new electronic version. This was originally inspired by Mahanaiam's need for a drum set, and we together decided that investing in a new set would be beneficial to all users of the church building.

Our team this year was Bill, Karl, Chuck, Abigail, Ross, Elena, Yi Fei, and Nathan. Ross was just about to start playing with us in 2020 when the pandemic ended our in-person services, so it was a wonderful blessing to have him join us in July. He and his family are returning to Scotland at the end of March, and we thank God for the time they have been with us. We also said goodbye to Abigail at the end of the summer, as she stepped into married life with EJ. Elena was able to sing with us starting this year, and we look forward to her singing her way through to her MIT graduation.

It has been a blessing and honor to serve the church in musical worship. We ask for your prayers and welcome your feedback.

3. Like most communities Covid has kept people from relating closely together. That is why we sought to meet in person even though many people did feel comfortable yet. Continuing our online presence with continued fellowship and prayer times kept people connected, even from great distances.

4. Drawing in new people will be a continuing effort over the coming summer months as well as increasing opportunities to fellowship together.

5. As the building use increases, which has been a blessing, Pastor Dan has had to pay more attention to this. We are looking at ways to reduce his focus on this.

Trying to build a more effective Elder team has been exciting but also a challenge. We are trying to set aside one meeting a month to focus on what God is doing in our lives and praying for each other individually and as team members. God has been gracious to doing this since we started setting a meeting aside for this effort, because it can always get pushed off since church business can come up. Dorothy Wemett, known to all as Mama Dot, made the hard decision to no longer attend Cambridgeport Baptist in-person. This led to a completion of her service as the leader of the Greeting Ministry. Mama Dot is missed greatly for her tireless dedication to the ministry which she ran with such order and thoughtfulness for many years. The greeters continue to welcome attendees at the door, count all those in attendance, collect the offering from the plates, and prepare/clean up communion on the first Sunday of the month.

I am hopeful that members of our team who have been unable to serve due to pandemic complications will soon be able to again be an active greeter! You are missed and I thank you for serving with the team in the past. I would also like to thank current team members: Angel Katche, Holly Wiegand, Kayla Berg, and Melaku Zewde.
